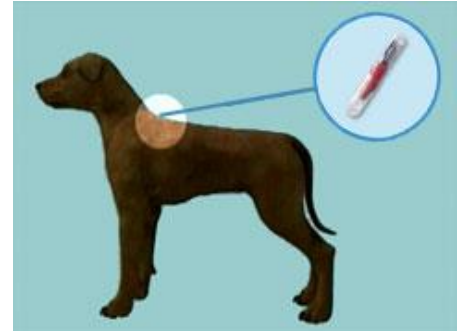

ESKA SAYS THANK YOU FOR MAKING MY MOUTH BETTER!!



Eska is an 8 year old Cocker Spaniel who has recently undergone major dental surgery to extract several teeth. She is pictured above with the Thank you card we sent her for her very kind gift at Christmas and, as you can see, she is having no problems now in using her mouth despite the gaps! Indeed, she manages much better now that the rotten teeth are out. Eska did not show any obvious signs of dental disease and it was discovered when she came for her annual vaccination and health check. The owner has commented, however, that she is so much happier after the surgery and this is quite a common finding. The dog appears to cope with the discomfort but once the pain and discomfort is no

longer there, they are much brighter. This is why it is so important to have your pets' teeth checked at regular intervals. Signs of dental disease can also be quite subtle behavioural changes which people just put down to them 'getting older', but are actually signs of discomfort. Some pets will show signs such as reluctance to chew, smelly breath, crying out, salivating, or pawing at the mouth. If your pet is showing any of these signs, then it should be checked as soon as possible.

HOME DENTAL CARE



The best way to try and keep your pets teeth as clean as possible and avoid dental disease is daily tooth brushing. Some dogs and cats will not allow this, however, so you can also use dental diets which have been formulated to remove plaque and tartar as the cat or dog chews the kibble.



Dental chews will also help to prevent or delay the onset of dental disease.



DENTAL TREATMENT EXPLAINED

Dental treatment requires a general anaesthetic. Once under anaesthetic, the mouth and each tooth can be fully examined and a chart is filled in to show any problems. Any large amounts of tartar are removed and the teeth checked again to ensure there are no problems under the tartar. Any extractions are then performed and the teeth can then be scaled and polished. Your pet is continually monitored during the procedure and until fully recovered. Pain relief is also given and your pet is discharged when completely recovered.
